Please help make Los Angeles a city that supports our native monarch butterflies by signing the National Wildlife Federation's Mayors' Pledge on Dec. 1, 2021.

Los Angeles can be a leader in saving the monarchs by promoting habitats suitable to their feeding and reproduction.

In California, the monarch butterfly population has fallen more than 95% since the 1980s. This alarming trend can be mitigated and reversed through planting and protecting California native plants, especially California milkweed, which provides the iconic butterfly's preferred habitat for feeding, egg-laying and pupating.

Already, more than 389 U.S. cities, municipalities and other communities have committed to creating healthy habitats for monarch butterflies and other pollinators. In doing so, they are educating residents on how they can make a positive difference at home and in the wild.

We want Los Angeles to join the front ranks of communities working to save and protect our treasured monarch butterflies.

In West Hills, we have identified and mapped more than 4,000 existing native milkweed plants at Orcutt Ranch Horticultural Center. We want Orcutt Ranch to be designated as an official Monarch Butterfly Habitat. We believe this can be the largest such habitat in Los Angeles County.

The West Hills Neighborhood Council looks forward to working with your office and Council District 12 to accomplish this designation.

Speed Mitigation Plan/Overspeed Detection For West Hills, CA

Problem Statement

West Hills has a large quantity of long, and wide streets that have little to no controlled intersections. While this is great for traffic flow, it has created an environment of dangerous conditions for speeding.

Summary

Increases in accidents and fatalities as well as the general concern by West Hills Stakeholders demands a review and investigation on possible solutions to mitigate speeding in our community. There are several considerations that must be taken into account before identifying a potential solution. These include traffic flow, effectiveness of mitigation methods versus the negative impact on traffic as well as the long term viability of the mitigation response.

Issues With Recommended List of Mitigation Methods

We reviewed the pre-approved list of mitigation options that are currently available. The list includes making physical changes to the street, speed notification devices, and the direct interdiction by Law Enforcement. Unfortunately, there seems to be an inverse relationship between the success of most of the mitigation methods with the impact on traffic flow. Several streets in West Hills are major traffic routes through the West Valley. Any solution to manage this issue must not adversely affect normal traffic flow. Direct interdiction by Law Enforcement has the highest positive impact on traffic safety, but is very inefficient and cannot be relied on as a full time solution.

Proposed Solution

One geographic feature unique, but fairly common to West Hills are long and wide streets. Having streets with large gaps in traffic control systems does have a positive impact on traffic flow, but has the unintended consequence of allowing for speeding. This is happening at an increasing frequency. We believe the best solution that would have the greatest mitigation on the negative effects of these types of streets, but minimal impact on traffic flow is to install traffic light controlled pedestrian crosswalks will overspeed detection. These would be installed between our long streets dividing them into smaller controlled pedestrian segments. These traffic lights would be equipped with passive infrared sensors that can detect the speed of

approaching cars and set a predefined speed above the posted limit. Should someone approach the light beyond this threshold, it would trigger a red light at the crosswalk. For shorter streets that are identified as high risk for speeding we request that intersection lights be modified to also support overspeed detection. Finally, we ask that all traffic lights that have overspeed support have the capability to log instances of being triggered with a timestamp (no driver information will be collected). By logging overspeed triggers we can identify location, and time of day that are potentially at higher risk of speeders and as a result we can deploy Law Enforcement to supplement mitigation. This approach would solve multiple problems. First, it would limit the damage done by speeding by restricting the availability of long open lanes of streets. Second, it would allow for more spaces for pedestrians to safely cross the streets, and finally, it would have a low impact on normal traffic flow. This is existing technology, and can be installed with minimal physical or fiscal impact.




Figure 32. Emission and reflection of energy by vehicle and road surface.

When a vehicle enters the sensor's field of view, the change in emitted energy is used to detect the vehicle as illustrated in Figure 32. A vehicle entering the sensor's field of view generates a signal that is proportional to the product of an emissivity difference term and a temperature difference term when the surface temperatures of the vehicle and road are equal. The emissivity term is equal to the difference between the road and the vehicle emissivities. The temperature term is equal to the difference between the absolute temperature of the road surface and the temperature contributed by atmospheric, cosmic, and galactic emission. On overcast, high humidity, and rainy days, the sky temperature is larger than on clear days and the signal produced by a passing vehicle decreases. This, in itself, may not pose a problem to a properly designed passive infrared sensor operating at the longer wavelengths of the infrared spectrum, especially at the relatively short operating ranges typical of traffic management applications (Klein , 2001).

Application and Uses

Multi-channel and multi-zone passive infrared sensors measure speed and vehicle length as well as the more conventional volume and lane occupancy. These models are designed with dynamic and static-thermal energy detection zones that provide the functionality of two inductive loops. Their footprint configuration is shown in Figure 33. The time delays between the signals from the three dynamic zones are used to measure speed. The vehicle presence time from the fourth zone gives the occupancy of stationary and moving vehicles.

WHEREAS, speed is the primary factor in fatal traffic collisions and continues to kill hundreds of people in Los Angeles every year; and

WHEREAS, speeding motorists are making the streets in West Hills increasingly dangerous in recent years, resulting in many accidents, injuries and deaths; and

WHEREAS, the tragic death of Colleen Wong on March 19, 2021, who was killed by a driver who was travelling at a very high rate of speed on a surface street, shows that it is imperative to address speeding on our streets; and

WHEREAS, police have limited resources available to patrol our community's streets, especially at night, when street racing is most prevalent; and

WHEREAS, such measures as road humps, roundabouts and traffic choke points are impractical on major arteries like Valley Circle Boulevard, Platt Avenue, Sherman Way, Roscoe Boulevard, Fallbrook Avenue and Shoup Avenue; and

WHEREAS, one geographic feature unique, but fairly common to West Hills are long and wide streets. Having streets with large gaps in traffic control systems does have a positive impact on traffic flow, but has the unintended consequence of allowing for speeding. This is happening at an increasing frequency; and

WHEREAS, mitigation on the negative effects of these types of streets, but minimal impact on traffic flow is to install traffic light controlled pedestrian crosswalks will overspeed detection. These would be installed between our long streets dividing them into smaller controlled pedestrian segments. These traffic lights would be equipped with passive infrared sensors that can detect the speed of approaching cars and set a predefined speed above the posted limit. Should someone approach the light beyond this threshold, it would trigger a red light at the crosswalk; and

WHEREAS, in addition to installing traffic controlled pedestrian crosswalks, several existing intersections that have been identified as high speed zones, also have overspeed detection sensors added to them; and

WHEREAS, all installed overspeed detection sensors be capable of recording a timestamp and location, so that any light or lights that have a high number of red light activations, can be identified so the City can supplement these sensors with law enforcement support

LET IT BE RESOLVED that the West Hills Neighborhood Council urges LADOT, the Los Angeles City Council and CD12 to investigate passive infrared sensor controlled traffic signals at pedestrian crosswalks between existing traffic signaled intersections.

As the Los Angeles City Councilmember representing much of the West San Fernando Valley, including the West Hills community, we respectfully request that you request a member of the West Hills Neighborhood Council (WHNC) be added as a voting At-Large Member to the Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) Community Noise Roundtable. The Chair of the Roundtable is Denny Schneider, 1 World Way Los Angeles, CA 90045.

The West San Fernando Valley and West Hills in particular, are impacted by noise from LAX departures, Van Nuys Airport departures and arrivals, and Burbank Airport arrivals. The cumulative impact of these flights has created noise issues for our stakeholders that have been magnified since the implementation of the Metroplex plan and the steady increase in air traffic from all three airports. At present, the West San Fernando is only represented on the Roundtable by Woodland Hills (WHWCNC), which is within CD3.

WHNC meets the requirements of the Roundtable's bylaws. As a certified neighborhood council established pursuant to the Los Angeles City Charter, it has a formal structure including bylaws, members who are elected by West Hills stakeholders, and regular meetings conducted in accordance with the Ralph M. Brown Act. WHNC recently passed a resolution to make this request. We feel that CD12 and West Hills should have a voting voice on this roundtable.

If WHNC is added as an at-large voting member, on behalf of the WHNC, we respectfully request that Brad Vanderhoof, WHNC Secretary, serve as our designated representative, and that Brian Begun, Member WHNC Streets and Transportation Committee, serve as the alternate.

Mr. Schmerelson, Dr. McKenna, Mr. Melvoin, Ms. Gonez - Affirming the Value of Jewish Students, Staff, and Families in the Los Angeles Unified School District and Addressing Anti-Semitism (Res 001-21/22) (Waiver of Board Rule 72)

Whereas, There has been a significant rise in hate crimes here in Los Angeles and across the country over the last four years against many racial, ethnic, religious, and other minority groups, and LAUSD has a long history of centering the positive contributions of the Black, Latinx, Asian American and Pacific Islander, women, LGBTQ+, and other communities;

Whereas, This discrimination, racism, xenophobia, sexism, homophobia, and anti-Semitism has not only generated heated rhetoric but has resulted in harassment, vandalism, physical assaults, and worse, and no individual or group within our District should fear becoming targets of retaliation, derision, bullying, isolation, or violence;

Whereas, Students who identify as Jewish come from all racial and ethnic backgrounds, including those with overlapping racial and ethnic identities, and attend schools in all six Local Districts, and Los Angeles is home to the third largest Jewish population in the world behind Israel and New York, and approximately 15 percent of the K-12 child population within LAUSD's boundaries are themselves or have family members who are Jewish;

Whereas, What we teach our youth about their ancestral legacies and cultures is essential in the fight for racial and ethnic justice and equity, and the promise of full inclusion and desegregation in LAUSD or public schools has not yet been realized;

Whereas, LAUSD publishes policy bulletins and memoranda on an annual basis affirming the value and dignity of all racial, ethnic, and religious groups, including MEM-5466: Calendar of Commemorative Dates and Observances, and offers the opportunity for Jewish students and staff to observe the Jewish holidays of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur with unassigned days in the school calendar;

Whereas, Property and vandalism crimes against Jewish temples and places of worship and physical assaults against people who "look Jewish" or dine at restaurants frequented by Jewish people has increased significantly over the past four years and most recently due to the escalation of the conflict and military action in Israel, Gaza, and in the Middle East, and was denounced by President Biden and Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti, the City Council, and faith leaders from across the Los Angeles region;

Whereas, Reports of white supremacist, anti-Semitic, anti-Jewish, and anti-Israeli graffiti, bullying, harassment, and violence on LAUSD campuses has been on the rise for the past four years, and administrators, teachers, and student leaders need updated and readily available training and resources to prevent and address anti-Semitism in all its forms;

Whereas, The social content of instructional materials used in California public schools must comply with California Education Code section 60040-60045 and 60048 as well as the State Board of Education guidelines

in the Standards for Evaluating Instructional Materials for Social Content in that they must portray accurately and equitably the cultural and racial diversity of American society, and Section 51500 states that "teachers shall not give instruction and a school district shall not sponsor any activity that promotes a discriminatory bias on the basis of race or ethnicity, gender, religion, disability, nationality, or sexual orientation", or another protected characteristic;

Whereas, Prolonged exposure to curricula that normalizes and perpetuates white supremacy, and the erasure of racial, ethnic, and religious minority groups can be alienating and traumatic for students and staff and contribute to the opportunity and achievement gaps we see today; now, therefore, be it,

<u>Resolved</u>, That the Board of Education denounces the rise in anti-Semitic, anti-Jewish, and anti-Israel<u>i</u> rhetoric and hate-motivated crimes and incidents <u>that denigrate Jewish students</u> and <u>staff</u> in the communities served by LAUSD in order for every LAUSD campus and office to be a safe and welcoming environment for all students, staff, and families;

<u>Resolved</u> further, The Board declares the need for updated bulletins, curricular and instructional resources, and training for teachers, staff, administrators, students, and parents to address and prevent anti-Semitism and respond when anti-Semitic vandalism, bullying, harassment, or violence occurs either on campus or in the community, including specific reference to anti-Semitism in the mandated bulletins training at the start of each school year;

Resolved further, That LAUSD will proceed with full implementation of the California-adopted History Social Science Framework for California Public Schools, Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve (2017) and its Appendix F on Religion and History-Social Science Education educate LAUSD students and all elementary, middle, and high school history-social science teachers about the positive contributions of Jewish peoples and to reduce anti-Jewish hate speech and hate-motivated behavior and incidents, and, be it finally;

Resolved, That to accomplish these objectives, the Board directs the Superintendent to (1) direct all schools and offices to affirm the rights of Jewish students, staff, and families and to report acts of anti-Semitism in schools and the workplace using District procedures; (2) ensure that the Division of Instruction and Office of Human Relations, Diversity, and Equity establish a curriculum and professional development working group to recruit and compensate LAUSD teachers and administrators with expertise in the areas of Jewish history and culture and the Holocaust, and invite other expert groups such as the Anti-Defamation League, Simon Wiesenthal Center and J Street to update and revise any existing LAUSD curriculum, recommended grade level reading lists, or instructional resources to ensure they are inclusive and reflective of best practices and the full diversity of Jewish people including those in California and Los Angeles, and (3) report back to the Board within 90 days with an update on these efforts.

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The West Hills Neighborhood Council supports Resolution 001-21/22 addressing Anti-Semitism in our schools.

There is a rise in child population within LAUSD's boundaries are themselves or have family members who are Jewish and what we teach our youth about their ancestral legacies and cultures is essential in the fight for racial and ethnic justice and equity, and the promise of full inclusion and desegregation in LAUSD or public schools. Students who identify as Jewish come from all racial and ethnic backgrounds, including those with overlapping racial and ethnic identities, and attend schools in all six Local Districts. Los Angeles is home to the third largest Jewish population in the world behind Israel and New York, with approximately 15 percent of the K-12 population within LAUSD's boundaries is themselves or have family members who are Jewish. There has been a significant rise in hate crimes here in Los Angeles and across the country over the last four years against many racial, ethnic, religious, and other minority groups, and LAUSD has a long history of centering the positive contributions of the Black, Latin, Asian American and Pacific Islander, women, LGBTQ+, and other communities; This discrimination, racism, xenophobia, sexism, homophobia, and anti-Semitism has not only generated heated rhetoric but has resulted in harassment, vandalism, physical assaults, and worse, and no individual or group within our District should fear becoming targets of retaliation, derision, bullying, isolation, or violence.

Dr. McKenna, Mr. Schmerelson - Ensuring Local School Site and Community Control, Authority, Autonomy and Choice Regarding Safe Campuses and the Protection of Our Students and Staff (Res-027-20/21)

Whereas, In May 2018, the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District entered into a three-year employment contract with Mr. Austin Beutner to serve as Superintendent of Schools for the Los Angeles Unified School District;

Whereas, The hallmark characteristic of Superintendent Beutner's leadership and reorganization plan and policies, enthusiastically supported by a majority of the Board of Education and numerous local non-profit organizations, has been the decentralization of resources and decision making in order for each school site and school community to be able to assess the unique needs and priorities of their students, families, local neighborhoods, and community partners;

Whereas, In an April 21, 2021 letter to the Board declining an extension of his contract, Mr. Beutner stated that with the support of the Board and that of many partners in labor, government, industry, the community and the homes of each family and every student, we have "(t)ransformed Los Angeles Unified from a top-down, one-size-fits-all bureaucracy into 44 nimble local teams, each dedicated to the community it serves" and unequivocally asserted that community schools unite families, educators, and community partners to provide all students with quality instruction, enrichment activities, physical and mental health services and social-emotional supports which create the opportunity for children to succeed in school and in life;

Whereas, As the largest authorizer of charter schools in the nation, the District has long been considered a major proponent of allowing parents and families to choose or be assigned to publicly funded schools that are independent, autonomous and not bound by centrally generated policies and practices that their local school community may not support, thus allowing families who live in the attendance areas for independent charter high schools such Granada Hills, Pacific Palisades, Birmingham, and El Camino Real to assess the needs of their schools and local communities, freely discuss options, and make decisions concerning critical issues such as school climate, health, safety and protecting students and staff - discussions and decisions not currently available to neighboring affiliated charter high schools such as Sylmar, Taft, Cleveland, and Reseda;

Whereas, Public opinion research on school safety involving over 44,000 students, parents and school staff was conducted in October, 2020. Survey results showed a broad range of opinions about what public safety measures respondents preferred or made them feel most comfortable including key findings that, across the demographic subgroups surveyed, perceptions of the Los Angeles School Police Department were largely positive, and among parents and staff there was significant opposition to reducing the presence of school police;

Whereas, Attitudes toward school policing are likely viewed through the lens of perceived levels of campus safety and perceptions of school police, including the following:

- The broadly held view that campuses are generally safe before, during, and afterschool;
- High degrees of consensus that school police are engaged in emergency response activities and protecting campus perimeters, but less certainty around other areas of engagement; and
- Less familiarity with segments of the community that may be negatively impacted by school policing;

Whereas, In the 2019-2020 school year, out of 115,000 services calls, there were only 10 total complaints against school police from staff, parents or students;

Whereas, Each school site is responsible for developing a comprehensive safety plan based on the needs of the campus climate, which is reflective in the cornerstone value of the Community Schools model of local autonomy and decision making, yet school-based administrators have expressed profound unreadiness and a lack of empowerment as it relates to accessing all available resources to aid in optimizing school safety for their campuses in a way that aligns with the true spirit of local control;

Whereas, The Board and District staff - understanding that the District covers an area totaling 710 square miles, including most of the city of Los Angeles and all or portions of 26 cities and unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County - are currently engaged in profound discussions about the need for equitable resource allocation based on the recognition that school communities have different needs based on unequal and different opportunities, resources and experiences; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the students, parents and staff who constitute the different and diverse school communities throughout the Los Angeles Unified School District be granted the authority and flexibility to discuss, determine and decide on the measures they believe will improve and maintain positive school climate and safety on their school campuses.

The West Hills Neighborhood Council supports the need for School Police on our Middle School and High School Campuses for the following reasons:

- 1. School Policemen are given additional specialized training in the handling of adolescents and teenage students.
- 2. As students arrive at school, School Police are there to welcome them.
- 3. School Police make it their mission to learn who the students are and if there are any problems, either at home or at school. This knowledge allows them to intercede and help the student.
- 4. As our school campuses are locked down and there is only one entrance to the campus, the presence of School Police give a sense of comfort and safety on the campus to both the students and their families.
- 5. Without the immediate presence of the School Police, it could take up to 30 minutes for them to arrive in the event of an emergency.

We therefore recommend that there be School Policemen at all of our Middle School and High Schools.
