OPENING BUSINESS:

President and Co-Chair Dan Brin called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. Secretary Carolyn Greenwood called roll and established **quorum.**

Approval of Board Meeting Minutes of December 5, 2019 were approved as written.

20-0001 – Discussion and possible action regarding approval of the WHNC's November 2019 Monthly Expenditure Report (MER)

November 2019 MER approved with 20 yes votes and two (2) absent and three (3) ineligible.

Anthony Brosamle went over the Controller's report and explained the column listed at "Balance (Pre/Post)" as a budgeted item's beginning budget amount and current unspent amount at time of the report.

Alec Uzemeck stated he had nothing to add to the WHNC Budget Status Report as of November. He was asked why there was a \$200 balance listed under item 11 when the event is over and the monies have been spent. Alec said he would check his notes and get back to the Board.

COMMENTS FROM THE CHAIR:

Mr. Dan Brin stated he was glad to be here and wished everyone a Happy New Year.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Loraine Lundquist introduced herself and spoke about her run for the District 12 City Council seat.

Glenn Bailey, on behalf of VANC (Valley Alliance of Neighborhood Councils), spoke about the annual VANC mixer which will be on March 12. He thanked the Board for its past support and hoped for its continued support of the event.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

LAPD Officer Sean Dinse introduced the new acting Senior Lead Officer (SLO), Joseph (Joe) Bain, who will be handling Officer Sean Brown's area of West Hills. Officer Bain's contact number is (424) 652-1544.

Freddy Cupen-Ames, who shares responsibility with Semee Park as representative from the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment to the WHNC, stated that there will be an open house on January 22 in the Valley and that the NC Congress will be take place on Saturday, September 26, 2020.

Tessa Charnofsky, district director for Supervisor Sheila Kuehl's office, advised that the entire Board of Supervisors voted to support that cleanup at SSFL be to the highest level of remediation. There will be an open house at the Supervisor's Calabasas office on January 16 at 5:30 p.m.

LAUSD District 3 Board Member Scott Schmerelson's administrative assistant, Tara Vahdani, spoke about happenings in the district.

NEW BUSINESS:

Event Approval Request form passed with 20 yes votes, three (3) absent and two (2) ineligible.

20-0003 – Discussion and possible action on approving \$30 for the Beautification Committee's January Cleanup activity.

Recommendation to approve expenditure passed with 20 yes votes, three (3) absent and two (2) ineligible.

20-0004 – Discussion and possible action on approving an NPG for Pomelo Community Charter in the amount of \$800.00 for support of school garden.

Board Member Aida Abkarians recused herself and left the room.

Stakeholder Marie Jandani spoke on the benefits of the garden for the students.

Recommendation to approve the NPG passed with 19 yes votes, three (3) absent, one (1) recusal and two (2) ineligible.

20-0005 – Discussion and possible action on approving an NPG for Welby Way Charter and Gifted/High Ability Magnet Center Elementary School in the amount of \$800 for garden supplies.

Recommendation to approve the NPG passed with 20 yes votes, three (3) absent and two (2) ineligible.

8:35 - Board Member Bonnie Klea left.

20-0006 – Discussion and possible action on approving an NPG for Hamlin Charter Academy in the amount of \$836.00 for 100 Logitech stereo headsets.

Recommendation to approve the NPG passed with 18 yes votes, two (2) no votes, four (4) absent and one (1) ineligible.

20-0007 – Discussion and possible action on a draft letter to Assemblyman Gabriel's office for 2020 Legislative Agenda – "Require Salary Range Disclosures for All Jobs Posted Online".

Stakeholder, Gabrielle Castleberry-Gordon spoke in support of both agenda items 20-0007 and 20-0008.

After much discussion regarding how the letter should be addressed and to whom it should be addressed, the motion to approve the letter as written passed with 18 yes votes, two (2) no votes, four (4) absent and one (1) abstention.

20-0008 – Discussion and possible action on amended draft letter to Assemblyman Gabriel's office for 2020 Legislative Agenda – "Just Cause Termination Protections."

Motion to approve the amended letter passed with 12 yes votes, six (6) no votes, five (5) absent and two (2) abstentions.



General Instructions

Section references are to the Internal Revenue Code unless otherwise noted.

U.S. person

Purpose of Form

A person who is required to file an information return with the IRS must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) to report, for example, income paid to you, real estate transactions, mortgage interest you paid, acquisition or abandonment of secured property, cancellation of debt, or contributions you made to an IRA.

Use Form W-9 only if you are a U.S. person (including a resident alien), to provide your correct TIN to the person requesting it (the requester) and, when applicable, to:

- 1. Certify that the TIN you are giving is correct (or you are waiting for a number to be issued),
 - 2. Certify that you are not subject to backup withholding, or
- 3. Claim exemption from backup withholding if you are a U.S. exempt payee. If applicable, you are also certifying that as a U.S. person, your allocable share of any partnership income from a U.S. trade or business is not subject to the withholding tax on foreign partners' share of effectively connected income.

Note. If a requester gives you a form other than Form W-9 to request your TIN, you must use the requester's form if it is substantially similar to this Form W-9.

Definition of a U.S. person. For federal tax purposes, you are considered a U.S. person if you are:

- An individual who is a U.S. citizen or U.S. resident alien.
- · A partnership, corporation, company, or association created or organized in the United States or under the laws of the United
- An estate (other than a foreign estate), or
- A domestic trust (as defined in Regulations section) 301.7701-7).

Special rules for partnerships. Partnerships that conduct a trade or business in the United States are generally required to pay a withholding tax on any foreign partners' share of income from such business. Further, in certain cases where a Form W-9 has not been received, a partnership is required to presume that a partner is a foreign person, and pay the withholding tax. Therefore, if you are a U.S. person that is a partner in a partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States. provide Form W-9 to the partnership to establish your U.S. status and avoid withholding on your share of partnership income.

The person who gives Form W-9 to the partnership for purposes of establishing its U.S. status and avoiding withholding on its allocable share of net income from the partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States is in the following cases:

• The U.S. owner of a disregarded entity and not the entity.

Required Salary Range Disclosure Letter

Dear Councilman Lee,

The West Hills Neighborhood Council would like to submit a formal request that your office forward the following letter to Assemblyman Gabriel's office, so that they can add the following proposed legislation to the upcoming 2020 Legislative Agenda.

Specifically, we propose amending the California Labor Code, Section 432.3, to require Employers who post jobs online to disclose the Salary Range for the position, institute penalties for non-compliance, and close loopholes that allow Employers to circumvent these laws using third-party job boards.

In 2017, the California Assembly passed AB 168, which amended The California Labor Code to prohibit Employers from seeking salary history information and require Employers to provide the pay scale for a position to an applicant applying for employment upon request. This was an important step in helping employment applicants avoid, effectively, bidding against themselves during a job search.

Unfortunately for Californians, Angelinos, and West Hills residents, there are no enforcement mechanisms in place to ensure these provisions are being met, no penalties for companies who fail to meet these provisions, no specific language in the amended Labor Code that explicitly prohibits employers from circumventing these salary disclosure prohibitions by using third-party job boards to solicit this information, and no avenue for redress for Applicants victimized by Employers' failures to comply.

When contacted about these infractions, Employees at the Labor Standards Enforcement Office were unaware of either of the provisions in AB 168 mentioned above, and were similarly unaware of any potential actions that could be taken against the Employers once notified of non-compliance. If those responsible for enforcing labor laws are ignorant of the laws themselves, or any mechanisms to require compliance, what recourse does a harmed Applicant have to pursue?

Companies frequently break the law by responding to salary range requests, which they are obligated to provide once an inquiry has been made, by instead asking "What are you looking for?" (See Appendix A). Worse, many companies use third-party job board web sites (e.g., ZipRecuriter or Indeed) for job postings, and use these employment Agents to directly ask for prior salary disclosure (see Appendix B). Such questions are not vetted by these companies' legal departments unless an applicant visiting the site complains directly to their Legal Affairs Offices.

Searching for new employment, or "job-hopping" as it is sometimes called, is more frequent now than ever¹. Due to stagnated wages, employees who change jobs earn more than those who stay with the same Employer²
³, and those who stay in companies for longer than two years on average may earn 50% less over their lifetimes⁴.

Applicants for new employment must weigh a variety of factors when considering making a switch, including: the impact of possibly longer commute times, health care benefits offered, parental leave policies, and, most importantly, the salary range for the new position.

Unfortunately, it has become increasingly rare for any position posted to actually list the Salary Range for the position offered.

This lack of transparency by Employers can cause Applicants to waste valuable PTO or Sick Time interviewing for positions that they might never have considered had they known the Salary Range offered.

In their initial opposition to AB 168, the California Chamber of Commerce accidentally admitted that a lack of transparency between Employers and Applicants is an inefficiency in the Job Transition Market that should be remedied:

"... salary data can be used as a reference regarding whether the employee's expectations of compensation far exceed what the employer can realistically offer. Requiring both the applicant and employer to waste time on the interview process which, for highly compensated employees, could be lengthy, to ultimately learn at the end of the process that the employee would never consider taking the compensation offered is unnecessary." 5

Here, we partially agree with the Chamber; Employers should avoid this unnecessary market inefficiency by being required to post the Salary Range for *all* job openings, not just highly compensated positions.

For the concept of a "Free Market" to exist, in this case services provided in exchange for fair market compensation for those services, "perfect competition" *must also exist*. One of the conditions on which "perfect competition" relies is the concept of "perfect information" – All consumers (Employees) and producers (Employers) know all prices (Wages) of products and utilities (Services Provided) they get from owning each product. When this condition is absent, as is the case when Employers disclose the services they want provided, but not the wages at which they are willing to compensate those services, **Employers are, in fact, causing a** *market failure* in the Job-Opening – Job-Applicant marketplace.

Requiring Salary Range disclosure would also help to eliminate the gender wage gap. If all Applicants are able to see the Salary Range for jobs posted online, it becomes much more difficult for Employers to pay disparate wages to women and men.

California is one of six states that have enacted laws regarding salary histories. However, states like Connecticut and Delaware have also included specific penalties for breach of these statutes where California has not. In fact, Delaware, a state best known for the business-oriented legislation that makes it the favored jurisdiction for organization of business entities, levies fines⁶ between \$1,000 - \$5,000 for the first offense, and \$5,000 - \$10,000 for any subsequent offense thereafter.

A law was passed that gave Employers a chance to act in good faith about salary disclosures, and correct their market failure. *They have squandered that opportunity*. As it stands, with no practical enforcement and no consequential penalties for non-compliance with AB 168's provisions, the laws are effectively toothless, and applicants are still being harmed with no path for redress.

Therefore, in order to close non-compliance loopholes, strengthen enforcement measures, introduce penalties for Employers who are non-compliant, and level the inequity of the Employer-Applicant relationship, we propose the following amendments to California Labor Code Section 432.3:

Section 1.

Section 432.3 of the Labor Code is *amended* to read:

432.3.

- (a) An employer shall not rely on the salary history information of an applicant for employment as a factor in determining whether to offer employment to an applicant or what salary to offer an applicant.
- (b) An employer shall not, orally or in writing, personally or through an agent, seek salary history information, including compensation and benefits, about an applicant for employment.
- (c) Third-party job hosting websites* shall not, orally or in writing, seek information about prior salaries, benefits or other forms of compensation from applicants for employment.
- *(e.g., this would need to be defined to include sites like ZipRecruiter, GlassDoor, LinkedIn, Indeed, et al. that have ignored subsection (b))
- (d) An employer, upon reasonable request, shall provide the pay scale for a position to an applicant applying for employment.
- (d) An employer must post the salary ranges for all jobs posted online.
- (e) Jobs posted online include:
 - i. Any job posting by an Employer on that Employer's internal Job Board.
 - ii. Any job posting by an Employer on that Employer's external Job Board.
 - iii. Any job posting by an Employer through a third-party hosting site or Job Board (Indeed, LinkedIn, GlassDoor, ZipRecruiter, et al.)
 - iv. Any job posting by a Temporary Hire (i.e. "Temp") agency on behalf of another Employer.
 - v. Any job posting by a Staffing agency on behalf of another Employer.
 - vi. Any job posting by a Recruitment agency on behalf of another Employer.
 - vii. Any job posting by any other employment agency on behalf of another Employer.
- (f) The salary range posted shall be listed by Hourly or Annual Salary.
- (g) The salary range listed shall be based solely and entirely on the wages paid for the position and should not include:
 - i. 401k contributions or any other type of retirement savings account.
 - ii. Health plan premiums covered by the Company.

- iii. Any other Health plan benefits (HSA, HRP, HIS, FSA, etc.) contributions made by the Company.
- (h) The salary range for job postings must be based on the salary or salary ranges of existing employees of the Company with the same or similar job titles for the current fiscal year.
- (i) The upper limit of the posted salary range shall not be larger than 30% greater than the lower limit of the posted salary range (i.e. \$50,000 \$65,000).
- (j) Any party that is found in violation of subsections (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g), (h), (i) of this section by a court of competent jurisdiction shall be liable for \$2,500.00 for each violation. An action for such violations may be maintained by any one or more employees or applicants. Any subsequent violation thereafter would be subject to double damages. Any further violations thereafter would be subject to treble damages, and such legal and any additional equitable relief as the court deems just and proper. In addition, an employer who violates the above-mentioned subsections of this section may be found liable for compensatory damages, attorney's fees and costs, and punitive damages.
- (k) No action shall be brought for any violation of subsection (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g), (h), (i) of this section except within two years after such violation.
- (I) Section 433 does not apply to this section.
- (m) This section shall not apply to salary history information disclosable to the public pursuant to federal or state law, including the California Public Records Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 6250) of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code) or the federal Freedom of Information Act (Section 552 of Title 5 of the United States Code).
- (n) This section applies to all employers, including state and local government employers and the Legislature.
- (o) Nothing in this section shall prohibit an applicant from voluntarily and without prompting disclosing salary history information to a prospective employer.
- (p) If an applicant voluntarily and without prompting discloses salary history information to a prospective employer, nothing in this section shall prohibit that employer from considering or relying on that voluntarily disclosed salary history information in determining the salary for that applicant.
- (q) Consistent with Section 1197.5, nothing in this section shall be construed to allow prior salary, by itself, to justify any disparity in compensation.

Please consider adding this to your legislative agenda for 2020.

We are aware that AB 168 was introduced by Assemblywoman Eggman, and that therefore her office gets "first call" at any changes to this bill, but we request that you approach her about co-sponsoring these further amendments to the bill.





Just Cause Termination Protection Letter (As Amended)

Dear Councilman Lee,

The West Hills Neighborhood Council would like to submit a formal request that your office forward the following letter to Assemblyman Gabriel's office, so that they can add the following proposed legislation to the upcoming 2020 Legislative Agenda.

Specifically, we propose amending the existing California Labor Code by adding protective provisions regarding termination for "At Will" workers, the vast majority of employees, by requiring "Just Cause Protections" for terminations.

Nearly 80%¹ of Americans live paycheck to paycheck, with 60% having less than \$500² in savings. Additionally, since federal efforts to expand a single-payer health coverage system have been unsuccessfully, Americans' health care coverage remains tied to employment.

These same circumstances apply to Californians, Angelinos, and West Hills residents as well, and are major contributors to our homelessness crisis.

In essence, the very *maintenance of employment* becomes the thinnest line³ between shelter and homelessness, between health care coverage and no access to care.

With our entire system predicated on the dependency on employment for shelter and health care, how do we, as the state that often drags the rest of the nation forward, offer our residents so little protection from losing their employment and all that comes with it?

In California, employers are allowed to fire their employees for any reason, or no reason at all. They are not required to give justification, nor warning, nor are they required to try and take corrective actions for underperforming or struggling employees.

This inequality of labor power, and the dire consequences that may result from it, should be something we address in the upcoming legislative session.

"At Will" employment is not even particularly beneficial to businesses. Even business-friendly sources are able to capture the negative effects "At Will" employment presents to the workforce: fear of angering management, stifling of creativity, and a business culture of fear.⁴

Employers can also use "At Will" employment as a means to justify terminations for nefarious or even illegal reasons. Employees who become pregnant or who attempt to unionize can be terminated despite law to the effect these actions cannot be used as cause for terminations, all under the auspices of "At Will" employment. These same faulty invocations of "At Will" terminations can be used to justify equally invidious terminations based on race, gender, religion, age, or sexual orientation.

In these instances, the terminated employees can pursue redress in court, but this avenue is also fraught with inequity: Employers have legal departments and company resources to fight costly court battles, while terminated Employees rarely enjoy such advantages.

The California Labor Code⁵ does actually provide certain protections relating to the termination of employment "for a specified term" (e.g., 1-year or 5-years). However, the vast majority of rank and file

employees *are not* employed for a specified term, and thus do not enjoy any specific statutory protections.

It is time that they did.

With the Los Angeles City Council supporting AB 1481, requiring "Just Cause" for evictions, we think the next step to protect Angelinos and West Hills residents would be to enact a similar "Just Cause Termination" bill to protect us from the inequities and dangers of "At Will" employment terminations.

We believe this would be a tremendously important, and popular, legislative item. We have recently seen constituents of other states reject "At Will" and "Right to Work" legislation; I think it's time for California to join the push. These laws have been instrumental⁶ in destroying Unions, suppressing wages, and stifling employee satisfaction.

"Just Cause Termination" protections are not without precedent; Federal Employees, California State Employees, Los Angeles City Employees, and various Union members already enjoy these protections.

Why not protect all Californians as well?

Therefore, we request "Just Cause Termination" amendments to the California Labor Code to include, based on existing Montana State labor law⁷ but not be limited to, the following:

- 1. This part may be cited as the "Just Cause Termination Protection Act"
- II. This part sets forth certain rights and remedies with respect to wrongful termination.
- **Definitions.** In this part, the following definitions apply:
 - a. "Constructive termination" means the voluntary termination of employment by an employee because of a situation created by an act or omission of the employer which an objective, reasonable person would find so intolerable that voluntary termination is the only reasonable alternative. Constructive termination does not mean voluntary termination because of an employer's refusal to promote the employee or improve wages, responsibilities, or other terms and conditions of employment.
 - b. "Termination" includes a constructive termination as defined in subsection (a) and any other termination of employment, including resignation, elimination of the job, layoff for lack of work, failure to recall or rehire, and any other cutback in the number of employees for a legitimate business reason.
 - c. "Employee" means a person who works for another for hire. The term does not include a person who is an independent contractor.
 - d. "Fringe benefits" means the value of any employer-paid vacation leave, sick leave, medical insurance plan, disability insurance plan, life insurance plan, and pension benefit plan in force on the date of the termination.

- e. "Just cause" means reasonable job-related grounds for dismissal based on a failure to satisfactorily perform job duties, disruption of the employer's operation, or other legitimate business reason.
- f. "Lost wages" means the gross amount of wages that would have been reported to the internal revenue service as gross income on form W-2 and includes additional compensation deferred at the option of the employee.
- g. "Due Process" means:
 - i. Notice, specificity, and documentation of complaint
 - ii. Hearing with appropriate evidentiary safeguards
 - iii. Opportunity to introduce, and consideration of, mitigating circumstances
- "Public policy" means a policy in effect at the time of the termination concerning the public health, safety, or welfare established by constitutional provision, statute, or administrative rule.

IV. Elements of wrongful termination -- presumptive probationary period.

- a. A termination is wrongful only if:
 - i. it was in retaliation for the employee's refusal to violate public policy or for reporting a violation of public policy;
 - ii. the termination was not for just cause and the employee had completed the employer's probationary period of employment;
 or
 - *iii.* the employer violated the express provisions of its own written personnel policy.
 - iv. The stated violation of express written personnel policy has not been uniformly or recently enforced or has effectively passed into disuse.
 - v. The stated violation of express written personnel policy has been enforced in a discriminatory manner including where age, color, race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, disability, country of origin, etc., is the basis for such discrimination
 - vi. Due process has been denied
- b. During a probationary period of employment:
 - i. The employment may be terminated at the will of either the employer of the employee on notice to the other for any reason or for no reason.
 - ii. If an employer does not establish a specific probationary period or provide that there is no probationary period prior to or at the time of hire, there is a probationary period of 6 months from the date of hire.

v. Remedies.

 If an employer has committed a wrongful termination, the employee may be awarded lost wages and fringe benefits for a

- period not to exceed 4 years from the date of termination, together with interest on the lost wages and fringe benefits. Interim earnings, including amounts the employee could have earned with reasonable diligence, must be deducted from the amount awarded for lost wages. Before interim earnings are deducted from lost wages, there must be deducted from the interim earnings any reasonable amounts expended by the employee in searching for, obtaining, or relocating to new employment.
- b. The employee may recover punitive damages otherwise allowed by law if it is established by clear and convincing evidence that the employer engaged in actual fraud or actual malice in the termination of the employee in violation of (IV)(a)(i).
- c. There is no right under any legal theory to damages for wrongful termination under this part for pain and suffering, emotional distress, compensatory damages, punitive damages, or any other form of damages, except as provided for in subsections (a) and (b).

VI. Limitation of actions.

- a. An action under this part must be filed within 1 year after the date of termination.
- b. If an employer maintains written internal procedures, other than those specified in (VII), under which an employee may appeal a termination within the organizational structure of the employer, the employee shall first exhaust those procedures prior to filing an action under this part. The employee's failure to initiate or exhaust available internal procedures is a defense to an action brought under this part. If the employer's internal procedures are not completed within 90 days from the date the employee initiates the internal procedures, the employee may file an action under this part and for purposes of this subsection the employer's internal procedures are considered exhausted. The limitation period in subsection (a) is tolled until the procedures are exhausted. In no case may the provisions of the employer's internal procedures extend the limitation period in subsection (a) more than 120 days.
- c. If the employer maintains written internal procedures under which an employee may appeal a termination within the organizational structure of the employer, the employer shall within 7 days of the date of the termination notify the terminated employee of the existence of such procedures and shall supply the terminated employee with a copy of them. If the employer fails to comply with this subsection, the terminated employee need not comply with subsection (b).

VII. **Exemptions.** This part does not apply to a termination:

a. that is subject to any other state or federal statute that provides a procedure or remedy for contesting the dispute. The statutes

include those that prohibit termination for filing complaints, charges, or claims with administrative bodies or that prohibit unlawful discrimination based on age, color, race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, disability, country of origin, etc.

b. of an employee covered by a written collective bargaining agreement or a written contract of employment for a specific term.

VIII. **Preemption of common-law remedies.** Except as provided in this part, no claim for termination may arise from tort or express or implied contract.

We believe that adding these safeguards that Employers must meet to justify termination will have a massively positive effect on California Employees' morale and sense of security in employment.

More importantly, these protections will create a buffer between the possibility of homelessness and loss of health coverage; two of the most common, and most devastating, outcomes of victims of "At Will" employment terminations.

Please consider adding this to your legislative agenda for 2020.

This would further improve the confidence of Los Angeles City residents and voters in the political process and continue the City's efforts to empower small dollar donors, as recently achieved by the passage of the 6:1 Matching Funds Program laid out in Council File 15-1088-SI

MOTION

Developer Contribution Restrictions

The City of Los Angeles has enacted a robust set of laws designed to prevent any perception that the official actions of elected officials are influenced by campaign contributions. These laws include outright prohibitions on campaign contributions from registered lobbyists, restrictions on contributions by businesses that are contracting (or seeking to contract) with the City, and prohibitions on solicitations of contributions from City employees and commissioners. However, no such comparable regulations exist for developers seeking City approvals for potentially lucrative projects.

Enacting developer contribution restrictions would improve the confidence of Los Angeles City residents and businesses, including developers, that discretionary approvals of development projects are made on the merits and without regard to campaign contributions. This would further improve the confidence of Los Angeles City residents and voters in the political process and continue the City's efforts to empower small dollar donors, as recently achieved by the passage of the 6:1 Matching Funds Program laid out in Council File 15-1088-S1.

WE THEREFORE MOVE that the City Attorney, in consultation with the Ethics Commission staff, be requested to prepare and present a draft Ordinance, similar to the 2011 Measure H restrictions approved by City of Los Angeles voters, to prohibit contributions to City elected officials and candidates for City office from "Restricted Developers." "Restricted Developers" shall be defined to include the owner or owners of real property (and if ownership is held in the name of a legal entity, the term shall also include the principals of the entity), when (a) an application for any significant Planning Entitlement Process administered by the Department of City Planning for the property has been filed, and (b) the completion of the Planning Entitlement Process requires approval or other action by City elected officials or candidates for City office, and (c) the Planning Entitlement Process involved would allow the construction or addition of more than 4,000 square feet of residential floor area or 15,000 square feet of commercial floor area. The prohibition on contributions described herein would extend from the date of the application to a date 12 months following the final resolution of the application.

WE FURTHER MOVE that the Chief Legislative Analyst, in consultation with Ethics Commission staff, be requested to report back on a strategy for a draft Ordinance restricting city officials from requesting, and developers and their principals from providing, behested payments under the same conditions described herein.

WE FURTHER MOVE that the City Attorney, in consultation with the Ethics Commission staff and the Chief Legislative Analyst, consider and provide recommendations for the application of similar restrictions to donations from builders requesting approvals from the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District.

SUMMARY

On October 29, 2019, the Resolution (Rodriguez – Koretz) was introduced in support for H.R. 1585 (Bass), the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2019, which would reauthorize grant programs under the Violence Against Women Act as well as expand critical protections for vulnerable populations such as youth, Native American women, LGBTQ persons, and survivors who lack shelter. The Resolution states that nearly one in four women report experiencing physical violence by an intimate partner and 45 percent of women killed in the United States die at the hands of an intimate partner. Vulnerable populations continue to face barriers to receiving services, and many undocumented immigrants are reluctant to report these crimes because of fear of deportation.

The Resolution recommends support for H.R. 1585 (Bass), which would reauthorize the expired Violence Against Women Act and make various improvements to the Act to meet the varied and changing needs of survivors.

BACKGROUND

The Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) was first enacted in 1994 and signed into law by President Bill Clinton in response to the prevalence of domestic and sexual violence, and the significant impact of such violence on the lives of women. Over the years, VAWA has improved the criminal justice system's ability to keep victims safe and hold predators accountable as well as provide victims with critical services, such as transitional housing and legal assistance. Since VAWA was signed into law, over \$7 billion in federal grants have been issued to state and local governments to facilitate programs that prevent domestic violence, sexual assault and dating violence. The law has since been reauthorized three times in 2000, 2005, and 2013. VAWA was most recently reauthorized in 2013 but expired on February 14, 2019 after lawmakers were unable to reach agreement on changes to the program.

The VAWA Reauthorization Act of 2019 reauthorizes VAWA through 2024 and makes various improvements to the Act to meet the varied and changing needs of survivors in a number of ways, including:

- Expanding Services, Training, Officers and Prosecutors (STOP) VAWA grants to include additional community resources for response to incidences of domestic violence.
- Increasing SMART Prevention Grant funding to support youth violence prevention education programs from \$15 million to \$45 million, each year through 2024.
- Increasing grants for combating violent crimes on campuses from \$12 million to \$16 million annually.
- Supporting training in early childhood programs on domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking.
- Expanding gun buying restrictions to include individuals with a misdemeanor conviction of domestic abuse or stalking.
- Preserving and expanding housing protections for survivors.
- Enhancing law enforcement tools and safeguards for the Office on Violence Against Women within the U.S. Department of Justice.
- Adding a new provision that would allow tribal courts to prosecute non-native people accused of domestic crimes or dating violence on tribal lands.

On April 4, the U.S. House of Representatives approved the VAWA Reauthorization Act of 2019 on a 263 to 158 vote but currently awaits Senate approval. Republicans oppose the bill for several reasons including the inclusion of protections for transgender people and a provision that would prohibit those convicted of misdemeanor charges of stalking or domestic abuse from purchasing firearms.

Approved by the voters on March 7, 2017, Proposition M allows for the recreational use, sale, and taxation of cannabis and cannabis-related products in the City of Los Angeles. The Department of Cannabis Regulation is responsible for both the licensing of cannabis-related businesses as well as the enforcement of the City's rules and regulations surrounding commercial cannabis activity.

During the creation of the regulatory framework for commercial cannabis activity, the City created an administrative process, whereby the Department of Cannabis Regulation, with the assistance of various City departments, is responsible for reviewing applications on a case-by-case basis for compliance as it relates to proximity to sensitive uses, security plans, and permits and fees, amongst many other things. As part of this review process, verification of criminal history for potential licensees is required to determine eligibility for a commercial cannabis license (LAMC Section 104.03). In order to verify criminal history, the Department of Cannabis Regulation would need to obtain access to state and federal summaries of criminal history through the Department of Justice.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council adopt the attached Resolution to authorize the Department of Cannabis Regulation to access state and federal level summary criminal history information through the Department of Justice for licensing of all owners of commercial cannabis businesses in the City of Los Angeles and may not disseminate the information to a private entity.

RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION OF THE LOS ANGELES CITY COUNCIL AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES TO ACCESS STATE AND FEDERAL SUMMARY CRIMINAL HISTORY FOR LICENSING PURPOSES THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

WHEREAS, Penal Code Sections 11105(b)(11) and 13300(b)(11) authorize cities, counties, districts and joint powers authorities to access state and local summary criminal history information for employment, licensing or certification purposes; and

WHEREAS, Penal Code Section 11105(b)(11) authorizes cities, counties, districts and joint powers authorities to access federal level criminal history information by transmitting fingerprint images and related information to the Department of Justice to be transmitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation; and

WHEREAS, Penal Code Sections 11105(b)(11) and 13300(b)(11) require that there be a requirement or exclusion from employment, licensing, or certification based on specific criminal conduct on the part of the subject of the record; and

WHEREAS, Penal Code Sections 11105(b)(11) and 13300(b)(11) require the city council, board of supervisors, governing body of a city, county or district or joint powers authority to specifically authorize access to summary criminal history information for employment, licensing, or certification purposes.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Los Angeles is hereby authorized to access state and federal level summary criminal history information for licensing of all owners of commercial cannabis businesses in the City of Los Angeles and may not disseminate the information to a private entity.
