FINAL BOARD ONLINE AND TELEPHONIC MEETING MINUTES Thursday, Nov. 5, 2020

Chair Dan Brin called the meeting to order at 6:34 p.m. Secretary Brad Vanderhoof called roll and established quorum. Vice President Char Rothstein led the Pledge of Allegiance.

"Halloween Houses on Display" Awards: Special Events Committee Co-Chair Myrl Schreibman described the event as "very successful," saying 32 houses participated and the event was popular with spectators. Mr. Schreibman thanked the Special Events Committee for all the work it took to coordinate the event.

Mr. Schreibman introduced Los Angeles City Councilmember John Lee, who presented awards from the city.

Mr. Schreibman presented the winners with West Hills certificates and trophies. Special Events Committee Co-Chair Steve Randall showed the certificates and trophies to the online audience.

Chair Comments: Dan Brin announced the passing of WHNC Board member Ron Sobel and LAPD Senior Lead Officer Sean Brown. A moment of silence was observed.

Induction of Board Member Marie Javdani: Ms. Javdani recited the Neighborhood Council Oath. Mr. Brin officially seated Ms. Javdani on the Board of directors of the West Hills Neighborhood Council.

Mr. Brin announced the WHNC has a vacancy. The application period will be open for 30 days and the Board will select a new member in January 2021.

The minutes from the October 2020 meeting were approved as amended.

Treasurer's Report:

20-0104 - Discussion and possible action regarding approval of the WHNC's September 2020 Monthly Expenditure Report (MER). Treasurer Carolyn Greenwood said the only expenses were regular monthly expenditures.

Mr. Brin said he and Sandi Bell presented a Certificate of Appreciation to the CEO of West Hills Hospital.

Controller's Report: Controller Saif Mogri reported the October spending. There were four invoices for the Halloween event for the award items and printing. Amazon double-invoiced an item but then removed the extra charge. Mr. Mogri added a column for invoice numbers to the report. He plans to add an additional column for the date the invoice is paid by the city.

Budget Report: Alec Uzemeck said there is currently an error of \$10.00 in the budget report, which he will correct.

Announcements:

Eric Moody, District Director, CD12 – The council district office is organizing community cleanups. Additional CARES Act funds are now available to aid restaurants in implementing al fresco dining. He thanked WHNC for participating in the recent Conversations with Councils. Councilmember Lee is pressing to reopen the West Valley Animal Shelter by the end of the year. CD12 continues to deliver senior meals on Thursdays.

Betty Wong-Oyama, Neighborhood Empowerment Advocate - To meet the Planning 101 training requirement, DONE is asking for Board action to ratify members of the NC's planning committee. The results should be submitted on the DONE template. There will be Zoom training in November and December with dates to be announced. A City Clerk Event Approval Request Form is not required for virtual events that do not include spending NC funds.

Upcoming training: Funding – Tuesday, Nov. 10, 2-4 p.m.; Tuesday, Nov. 24, no time stated. Social Media – Thursday, Nov. 12, 2-3:30 p.m.; Thursday, Nov. 19, no time stated.

Ms. Wong-Oyama announced she will retire in early 2021. Dan Brin and many members said they will be sorry to see her leave but wish her all the best.

Becca Brukman, representing Jesse Gabriel, California Assembly District 45 – The Assembly member will host a drive-through-open-house event on Thursday, Dec. 10, at the West Valley Food pantry. She will send details.

Tessa Charnoffsky, representing Supervisor Kuehl, District 3 – There were no major incidents at voting centers in the district. There will be a Parent Town Hall on Nov. 9 at 6:00 p.m.

Tara Vahdani, representing Scott Schmerelson, LAUSD District 3 – Justice Street Elementary is having a Turkey Trot all November; entry fee is \$25 and includes a T-shirt. Hamlin Charter Academy is holding a virtual Interactive Baking Experience on Nov. 13 at 1:30 p.m. LAUSD Virtual Town Halls will continue this month with a focus on hybrid learning and returning to school. The next Coffee with the Superintendent takes place on Dec. 1, 9-11 p.m.; people who do not have schoolchildren are welcome to ask questions. Grab-and-Go food centers are still operating.

Committee & Liaison Reports:

Streets and Transportation – Committee Chair Anthony Scearce said 19 trees were planted at Lazy J Ranch Park. He also said the utility box artwork project is fully approved and painting should begin next week.

Zoning and Planning: Committee Co-Chair Charlene Rothstein announced the meeting will move from the regular meeting day to Monday, Nov. 23. Normal schedule resumes in December.

Old Business:

20-0096 – CIS for CF-20-1267 (vehicle noise) and letter to CD 12 and city representatives regarding excessive vehicle exhaust noise and speeding/reckless driving exhibitions of speed: Dan Brin read the proposed letter. Myrl Schreibman said he does not feel the letter relates to the motion. After a discussion on the proper focus and scope of the letter, Anthony Scearce and Dan Brin agreed to restructure the letter.

New Business:

20-0105 - Vacant seat on the West Hills Neighborhood Council Board vacated by Bobbi Trantafello: Ad Hoc Vacancy Committee Co-chairs Charlene Rothstein and Steve Randall described the vacancy process and praised all candidates. Secretary Brad Vanderhoof explained that per the WHNC Bylaws a vacancy must be filled by a majority vote (more than 50% of votes cast) and a plurality (highest number of votes) is not sufficient. Mr. Randall said if a majority is not reached there would be a runoff. This seat has a term with 2½ years remaining.

The candidates are Bethany Jones, Brian Begun, Esperana Butler, Ymileth Jimenez-Garcia, Daniel Oszreicher, Cara MacIntosh. Each candidate spoke for two minutes. Ms. Jimenez-Garcia withdrew, citing the storm crisis in Central America. Mr. Randall said the committee recommended Bethany Jones for this seat.

Brian Begun answered: Government Relations, Streets, Special Events and Homelessness. Bethany Jones answered: Government Relations, Homelessness and Special Events. Cara MacIntosh answered: Government Relations, Education, Public Safety and Special Events. Sandi Bell asked Brian Begun to describe his computer experience. Brian Begun said he worked in the visual and graphics industry, has two computer science degrees, and currently works as a software engineer. Brad Vanderhoof asked that the other candidates be given an opportunity to answer the same question if they wish to. Mr. Randall agreed. Cara MacIntosh said she worked 13 years in the wireless telecommunications industry. Bethany Jones said she works from home with a computer as her primary tool and ran a podcast with a half-million viewers.

Dan Brin asked if the Homelessness Committee has gauged the opinion of the Chatsworth Neighborhood Council. They have not. Mr. Brin said he is uneasy about putting an address in another NC in a letter. He did say he supports both the Home Key concept and the Chatsworth project. In response to the question what this action means, Brad Vanderhoof answered that if passed it becomes an official position of the WHNC and can be stated as such by WHNC Board members. Charlene Rothstein suggested providing a letter of support for Project Home Key. Ms. Naturman said Councilmember Lee specifically asked for an opinion on the TravelLodge project.

Chair Comments

Dan announced there will be a memorial for Bobbi Trantafello this Saturday at West Valley Christian Church at 10 a.m. The service will be outside so please bring a chair if you can. Face masks and social distancing will be required.

Secretary Brad Vanderhoof called roll and established quorum.

Vice President Char Rothstein led the Pledge of Allegiance.

The minutes from the September 2020 meeting were approved as amended.

20-0098 - Discussion and possible action regarding approval of the WHNC's August 2020 Monthly Expenditure Report (MER). Treasurer Carolyn Greenwood said there are only two new items and they are both regular monthly expenditures, The Web Corner and Rackspace. The MER description for The Web Corner was changed to "Web Hosting."

Yes -19, No -0, Abstain -0, Absent -1, Ineligible -1, Recusal -0 **The August MER is approved.**

Controller's Report

Controller Saif Mogri reported the September spending: Go Daddy Internet domain name registration, (\$21.70), The Web Corner, Rackspace, and three (3) invoices for Apple One. Saif has done a rough inventory of the Montessori shed. He would like to remove everything from the shed and do a complete inventory. Mryl Schreibman asked where the A-frame signs are. Dan Brin replied they are at Orcutt Ranch. Aida Abkarians would like to see the existing cartons replaced with plastic totes. Joanne Yvanek-Garb suggested installing shelving units in the shed.

Public Comment

None.

Announcements

Eric Moody, District Director CD12 – CD12 continues to deliver senior meals on Thursdays. The Lunches With Love program delivers food to those experiencing homelessness on Wednesdays in partnership with local food pantries. The Angel Fund is continuing to provide support and the CD12 small business relief fund has made zero-interest loans in the amount of \$500K. At West Hills Hospital, CD12 did a smoothie give away to frontline and first-response workers. Saturday, Oct. 3, is the Stoney Point cleanup. Oct. 10 is the Valley Disaster Preparedness Fair. The Los Angeles City Council approved a transition plan to resume parking restriction citations and towing. Vehicles used for dwelling will be cited but not towed. The city is under a court order not to pick up bulky items related to homelessness.

Betty Wong-Oyama, Neighborhood Empowerment Advocate – The election handbook is out for NC feedback (clerk.electionsnc.org). Comments are due Oct. 3. The WHNC election representative is Nathan Singh and the election is on May 4, 2021. Diversity and equity training is delayed until next year. The department recommends each NC designate one youth seat (age 14-17). Planning committee members must complete the "Planning 101" course within 60 days. Outreach workshops are on Oct. 22 (Social Media) and Oct. 29 (Promotion and Media). The draft social media policy was presented to BONC on Oct. 6. On Oct. 29 there will be an election presentation by the City Clerk to the Council's committee responsible for NCs. The ADA language for NC agendas has changed. Funding and ethics training are due every two years. Send certificates to Betty for recording.

Becca Brukman, representing Jesse Gabriel, California Assembly District 45 – The assemblymember introduced four bills: state-funded homelessness programs (vetoed by governor); colleges must preserve financial aid status for students experiencing homelessness; gun violence reform; school districts can use low-income tax credits to build housing for students and staff.

Tessa Charnofsky, representing Supervisor Kuehl, District 3 – Vote center and drop box locations for November elections have been released. Local centers are El Camino Real CHS, Canoga Park HS, Columbus Middle School, and the Rose Goldwater community room. Drop box locations are Platt Branch Library, Lazy J Ranch Park, Shadow Ranch Park and Woodland Hills Recreation Center.

Tara Vahdani, representing Scott Schmerelson, LAUSD District 3 – On Oct. 6 there will be a "coffee with the superintendent" virtual event from 9 to 11 a.m. On Oct. 7 there will be a "meet the middle schools" virtual event from 6 to 8 p.m. (the enrollment window for fifth graders is open Oct. 1 to Nov. 13). Justice Street Elementary has a new rock garden with painted rocks.

Patricia Bates, Budget Advocates, Region 3 – The Budget Advocates have a new website, budgetadvocates.com. They will meet on Monday. Eighty percent of the Sepulveda Basin burned in early September, including the wildlife sanctuary.

Council Announcements

Special Events – Mryl Schreibman said marketing is under way for the Halloween Houses event and five houses have registered so far.

Bob Brostoff said Springfest 2021 has been cancelled.

Homelessness Liaison – Marie Javdani said Community Impact Statements are welcome on CF 20-0990 ,Anti-Bias and Diversity Training. The liaisons are working on homeless outreach for NC elections. There is a question on how the unhoused can establish stakeholdership.

New Business

20-0103 — **Discussion and possible action on responding to new age restrictions imposed on Neighborhood Council board members:** Eric Moody said the ordinance is approved, the uniform minimum voting age is 16, an the minimum age to serve on an NC board is 18, though there is a provision for an optional youth seat (14 to 16), and it is too late to protest. DONE is in the process of updating all NC bylaws. Steve Randall expressed concern about the youth seat creating a vacancy. Betty Wong-Oyama said she may be able to add the youth seat as an additional seat in the WHNC bylaws. Bob Brostoff and Anthony Scearce like the idea of forming a student committee. Betty said student committees may have student chairs. She will forward the verbiage used by another NC. Myrl Schreibman said he is opposed to a voting youth member on the Board. Glenn Bailey said the composition of a board is up to each individual NC. Reseda NC tried to have three youth seats because there are two large high schools within their boundaries. Northridge East extended the age to 20 because CSUN is within its jurisdiction. He also stated CF 18-0467, NC reforms, did not mention youth seats in the original motion.

Dan Brin moved to add a 26th seat to the WHNC Board of Directors with and age limit of 14 to 17. This will be a Board appointed seat. Bob Brostoff seconded.

Thomas Booth moved to amend the motion making the youth seat an elected seat. Bob Brostoff seconded.

Yes -10, No -9, Abstain -0, Absent -2, Ineligible -0, Recusal -0 **The amendment passes.**

Vote to add a 26th elected seat designated as a youth seat (age 14 to 17) to the WHNC Board

Yes -14, No -2, Abstain -3, Absent -2, Ineligible -0, Recusal -0 **The motion is approved.**

Betty advised that upon turning 18 a youth representative must step down.

PUBLIC SAFETY

MOTION

Throughout the city, a small number of people cause disproportionate disturbance through vehicle exhaust sound enhancements (otherwise known as modified mufflers). Modified mufflers on vehicles of all types can disrupt quality of life, especially in residential neighborhoods, due to their excessively loud noise. Sometimes these modified mufflers allow "backfires" and other loud noises that residents mistake for gunfire or explosions that lead to unnecessary calls for police response. Additionally, these loud noises can have particularly damaging implications for those with special sensitivities to loud noise, such as victims of PTSD.

Presently, there are existing laws that govern noises emitted by vehicles by both the City and the State. LA City Municipal Code § 114.02 and California State Vehicle Codes § 27150(a) and §27151(a) detail the laws surrounding appropriate muffler infrastructure, and neighborhood noise levels. More recently, the state adopted AB1824 which requires officers to issue tickets to people that violate state exhaust noise laws; previously, the tickets issued for this citation merited only a "fix it" warning.

The regulations for modified mufflers should be more heavily enforced and the council should consider whether the current local laws are sufficiently strong enough to address the public safety and quality-of-life issues that modified mufflers pose for our communities and users of the right-of-way.

One of the mandates of the Board of Directors of the West Hills Neighborhood Council (WHNC) is to promote the interests and concerns of its stakeholders and to assist stakeholders by safeguarding their well-being and safety.
Ever since Valley Circle Boulevard (V/C Blvd) was opened up from the 101 Freeway on the south to and beyond Roscoe Blvd on the north, V/C Blvd and Roscoe Blvd east of V/C Blvd have become centers for reckless driving and life-threatening, excessive displays of speed and exhibitions of speed.
There have already been at least four deaths on Roscoe and several horrific accidents on V/C Blvd. Those deaths and accidents necessitated the City's installation of traffic signals and controls on V/C Blvd at Highlander Road, Bell Canyon, and Dorie Drive, as well as traffic signals and controls on Roscoe at Lena Avenue and Jason Avenue Unfortunately, the reckless driving and excessive displays of speed have continued.
Recently our stakeholders have warned WHNC that also taking place on V/C Blvd and Roscoe are deadly speed racing and alterations to exhausts on cars, trucks and motorcycles, causing excessive noise and sounds similar to explosions and gunfire, often during the night, awakening frightened homeowners and causing 911 calls to police.
The frequency of the recklessness, excessive speeding and noise could be much lessened or eliminated by increase patrolling by law enforcement both during the day and especially at night and overnight.
WHNC understands that the present demands upon our law enforcement personnel have increased many-fold, but we implore you to immediately address these pressing issues before anyone else is seriously injured or dies. 

TRADE, TRAVEL, AND TOURISM

MOTION

On August 21, 2020, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) published a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the construction and operation of a replacement passenger terminal building and improvements at the Hollywood Burbank Airport. The FAA has allowed public comment on the DEIS for only 45 days, with the comment period set to end on October 4, 2020.

The COVID-19 emergency has curtailed opportunities for the kinds of robust public presentations that would typically be associated with a project of this magnitude, and this project may have significant impacts on Los Angeles neighborhoods. Even under normal circumstances, a 45 day comment period would not be adequate for a project of this magnitude, and it would be especially inadequate given the limitations inherent during the COVID-19 pandemic.

In order to allow fulsome and robust participation by all interested parties, particularly in communities near and impacted by the Hollywood Burbank Airport, the comment period should be extended. The City of Los Angeles should have adequate time to consider the impacts of the airport expansion project on the City and participate in the environmental review process to ensure that its interests and those of its residents are protected.

WE THEREFORE MOVE that the Council REQUEST the City Attorney to draft a letter calling upon the Federal Aviation Administration to extend the 45 day comment period to a total of 120 days, in order to allow all stakeholders, including the City, ample time to analyze the Draft Environmental Impact Statement related to the Hollywood Burbank Airport terminal project and submit their concerns.

WE FURTHER MOVE that the Council REQUEST the City Attorney, in concert with the Chief Legislative Analyst, the Planning Department, the Department of Transportation and all other relevant city agencies, to review the potential practical, legal and environmental impacts of the Hollywood Burbank Airport terminal project on the City of Los Angeles, and to submit comments in response to the project's Draft Environmental Impact Statement to the Federal Aviation Administration highlighting those impacts and requesting redress and mitigations that will protect the interests of the City and its residents.

TERMINATION OF CONTRACTS - NEGOTIATED BY JOSE HUIZAR

RULES, ELECTIONS & INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

MOTION

In the last several months, the United States Department of Justice has brought Federal criminal indictments against Councilmember Jose Huizar and former Councilmember Mitchell Englander. Several other former city employees also have pled guilty or appear to be under continuing investigation related to those indictments.

Among other things, the indictments contain allegations that real estate developers and others gave cash, cash equivalents, lavish gifts and other benefits to Huizar, Englander and other city employees with the intent to induce these public officials to violate their duties of trust to the people of Los Angeles.

California Government Code Section 1090 prohibits public officials, such as city employees and elected officials, from having a personal financial interest in contracts they enter into in their official capacity on behalf of the City. Government Code section 1092 provides that a contract that violates section 1090 may be avoided by any party.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council request the City Attorney to evaluate whether Councilmember Jose Huizar violated Government Code Section 1090 with regard to any real estate development agreement or other contract to which the City is a party, and further evaluate whether such development agreement or other contract is thereby void or subject to rescission, and report back to the City Council with recommendations about the City's potential legal remedies.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council instruct the Chief Legislative Analyst, in consultation with the City Attorney, the Department of City Planning and the Department of Building and Safety, to report to the City Council with recommendations for suspending the certificate of occupancy and reconsidering any and all discretionary approvals or entitlements for all projects referenced directly or indirectly in the Federal indictment of Councilmember Jose Huizar, and any other project for which the discretionary approval or entitlement was induced by the illegal activity of Councilmember Jose Huizar.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council request the City Attorney to evaluate whether the City of Los Angeles should pursue civil remedies against the individuals or firms referenced in the recent Federal indictments of Councilmember Jose Huizar and Councilmember Mitchell Englander for, among other things, depriving or conspiring to deprive the public and the City of their right to the honest services of employees of the City, including potential causes of action for recovery of foreseeable resulting economic harm.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council request the City Attorney to draft an ordinance prohibiting any property owner or developer from seeking any discretionary approval or entitlement in the future from the City of Los Angeles, if the City Council or any court determines that such property owner or developer has induced or conspired to cause a violation of Government Code Section 1090 or otherwise engaged in criminal conduct to defraud the City.

CLOSURE OF WEST VALLEY ANIMAL SHELTER

PERSONNEL AND ANIMAL WELFARE

MOTION

In November 2000, Los Angeles voters overwhelmingly approved Measure F which provided nearly \$533 million in bond funding for a major upgrade of the City's fire stations and animal shelters. Over the course of the ensuing years, almost all of that funding has been expended on projects to modernize and expand the City's fire and animal care facilities. This General Obligation Bond provided the necessary \$154 million in financing for the construction and/or rehabilitation of 8 animal shelters, most notably the West Valley Animal Shelter.

In response to the City's current financial situation, due to the impacts of COVID-19, our City departments have had to make temporary changes to their operating budgets and that includes the Department of Animal Services. However, it has come to the Council's attention that the once temporary plan to shutter City operations at the West Valley Animal Shelter, due to COVID-19, could now become permanent.

With both valley shelters covering a geographic expanse that constitutes 40% of the total area of Los Angeles, with an estimated 1.77 million population, it is imperative that the City maintain its operations at the West Valley Animal Shelter. In 2019, the West Valley shelter impounded a total of 9,320 animals, while the East Valley shelter impounded 14,605. The City would be negligent in their obligation to provide necessary services to all stray or lost animals if the West Valley shelter no longer operates as a city shelter and the burden to accommodate and care for an estimated 24,000 animals is left to only the East Valley shelter.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Department of Animal Services be instructed to report immediately to this council on the long term plan for the West Valley Animal Shelter.

Calls to City 911 emergency systems are being abused due to racial bias and this results in unnecessary wasted time and expense of City resources. Police reports are often not taken for these types of racially based incidents and they often do not have consequences to the caller. Without a police report, there is also little recourse for the victim of this type of racially based 911 call to take action of their own. Additionally, depending on the severity of the call it could result in bodily harm or false arrest of the victim.

On June 24, 2020, your Committee considered a Motion (Price - Wesson - Harris-Dawson -Koretz) relative to make it illegal to use the 911 emergency system to make a report, or cause a report to be made to law enforcement agencies, that an emergency or threat exists when the call is motivated / based on racial bias, and the caller knows that the report is false or frivolous. According to the Motion, calls to City 911 emergency systems are being abused due to racial bias and this results in unnecessary wasted time and expense of City resources. Police reports are often not taken for these types of racially based incidents and they often do not have consequences to the caller. Without a police report, there is also little recourse for the victim of this type of racially based 911 call to take action of their own. Additionally, depending on the severity of the call it could result in bodily harm or false arrest of the victim. The City should determine options to make it illegal to use 911 to make a report, or cause a report to be made to law enforcement agencies, that an "emergency or threat" exists motivated / based on racial bias, and the caller knows that the report is false or frivolous. This is a motion considered by the Ad Hoc Committee on Police Reform Report relative to make it illegal to use the 911 emergency system to make a report, or cause a report to be made to law enforcement agencies, that an emergency or threat exists, when the call is motivated by or based on racial bias and, most importantly, when the caller knows that the report is false or frivolous. There has apparently been misuse of the 911 system regarding racial bias. The result is wasted time and expense of precious City resources. Because police reports are usually not made for these types of racially based incidents, therefore there often are no consequences to the caller. Unfortunately, without a police report, there also is little or no recourse for the victim of a racially biased 911 call to take action on their own. Also the call could result in bodily harm or false arrest of victim, depending on the call's severity. This kind of use of 911 should be determined to be illegal so that criminal penalties could be assessed on the perpetrator and victims would possess rights to bring private civil actions and allow cost recovery by the City. The motion was approved by committee and is now before the City Council.

MOTION

Recent events have put Police Departments nationwide in an often unfavorable spotlight, as mostly peaceful protests unfold across the country. In this day of rampant social media and live streaming of real time events, it is of the utmost importance that our own Police Department (LAPD), continue to promote transparency and accountability within the Department, while providing the necessary training and support to officers, especially those related to the use of Body Worn Video Cameras, Digital In-Car Video, and the use of force.

LAPD officers are given significant responsibilities, and the public expects them to exercise their duties in a responsible manner. Further, the public expects that, if an officer fails in their duties, that they will be held to account. As the City works to create more inclusion and opportunities for community led initiatives, a fundamental goal must be to ensure that the Department comes out of this period better than before. An overview of key Department policies, and audits of officer compliance with Special Orders related to the use of force and video should be done, while the CAO works with the LAPD to create regularized reports on this subject.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Police Department (LAPD) be directed to report within 60 days with an overview of the LAPD Special Orders related to the Use of Force (Special Order 4), Body Worn Video Cameras (Special Order 12) and Digital In-Car Video (Special Order 45). This report should include data on LAPD compliance with these Special Orders and how LAPD supervisors enforce them.

I FURTHER MOVE that the LAPD Commission, and the Office of the Inspector General be requested to audit the Department's compliance with the above Special Orders.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Administrative Officer be directed to report, with the assistance of the LAPD, on the funding required to ensure audits of compliance with these special orders are performed annually.

ENERGY, CLIMATE CHANGE, AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE REPORT relative to requesting a report from the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) regarding causes and actions taken to address recent power outages, the delay in restoring power, and the plan to help prevent further power outages.

Recommendation for Council action, pursuant to Motion (Lee - Blumenfield):

REQUEST that the LADWP immediately report to the Council on the causes of recent power outages, actions taken to address the power outages, and the causes for the delay in restoring power; and, report to the Council on the plan to help prevent further power outages, especially at this time during the COVID-19 pandemic.

<u>Fiscal Impact Statement</u>: Neither the City Administrative Officer nor the Chief Legislative Analyst has submitted a financial analysis of this report.

Community Impact Statement: None submitted.

SUMMARY

At its regular meeting held on September 15, 2020, the Energy, Climate Change, and Environmental Justice Committee considered Motion (Lee - Blumenfield) relative to requesting that the LADWP immediately report to the Council on the causes of recent power outages, actions taken to address the power outages, and the causes for the delay in restoring power; and, to also report on the plan to help prevent further power outages during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The LADWP presented on the amount of customers who experienced power service interruptions and the average number of LADWP crews dispatched to restore service in August and September 2020 in comparison to prior years, staffing resources needed to replace distribution equipment in residential areas, new challenges impacting the power distribution system in residential neighborhoods due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the LADWP's response to controlling overloads during high peak days, response time to incidents within each Council District and the most affected communities during said heat storms, total number of distribution transformers replaced in the past three years under the Power System Reliability Program, and the LADWP's plan to address future power distribution overloads. The Committee and LADWP discussed the increased load demand in residential areas due to the COVID-19 pandemic, with more customers working and distance learning from home, unregistered businesses that moved from commercial areas to residential neighborhoods, increased air conditioning load, and increased electric vehicle charging needs. The Committee and LADWP also discussed the impact of cannabis grow houses in residential neighborhoods and the LADWP's enforcement efforts, LADWP's assessment service offered to customers to evaluate electrical capacity needs for residential upgrades, and the LADWP's response to address increased load demands in residential areas. Councilmember Krekorian requested a detailed written summary of the power system failure at the LADWP North Hollywood distribution station during the Labor Day 2020 weekend, including what occurred during the incident, what the failure was, and the location of said failure, directed to the Council District 2 Office.

After providing an opportunity for public comment, the Committee moved to approve the

recommendation contained in the Motion, as detailed above. This matter is now transmitted to the Council for its consideration.
