Approve Regular Meeting Minutes of August 4, 2022 – The minutes were approved as amended.

Senior Lead Officer Report: SLO Lopez spoke and said he is filling in for former SLO McNamee in southern West Hills. Officer Cory Garza is now the permanent Senior Lead Officer for northern West Hills. His contact information is <u>40811@LAPD.online</u>. SLO Garza plans to introduce himself at the next Board meeting. Crime Report:

Southern West Hills – violent crime is up 64% from 2021. Property crime is down 0.03%.

Northern West Hills – violent crime is up 13.5%. Property crime is up 4.5%.

The biggest driver for the violent crime upswing is rape. SLO Lopez said most of the violent crimes, including the tragic deaths of three children in a single incident, involve people who know each other.

Treasurer's Report Controller's Report: Controller Saif Magri said the only July expenses were office related. Saif mentioned that invoices matched with those paid by the City.

Council District 12: Colin Crews said 4118 signs are going up at parks to prohibit camping within 500 feet. Councilmember Lee voted to expand the prohibition to include all schools and day care facilities. This will take effect September 18. Department of Neighborhood Empowerment: John Darnell, Neighborhood Empowerment Advocate said legislative updates are back. Registration for the 2022 Congress of Neighborhoods opened August 27.

Los Angeles County Supervisor District 3 LAUSD District 3: Tessa Charnofsky spoke about the County's 211 emergency number. County libraries are open as cooling centers, and will have extended hours and be open Mondays during the heat wave. The deadline to apply to be a Youth Climate Commissioner (ages 18-30?) is September 15. The County is sponsoring a series of smart gardening classes online.

CA Assembly District 45: Field Representative Sarah Martin introduced Jack Trent Dorfman who will be taking over responsibility for the area including West Hills. Mr. Dorfman introduced himself. Ms. Martin said the Governor signed AB1929 concerning gun violence and victim assistance. She then gave a rundown of current bills in pending legislation.

Budget Advocates, Glenn Bailey: The Budget Advocates had their retreat and there are no major changes to report. They are forming committees aligned with the 40 city departments.

Department of Neighborhood Empowerment: John Darnell, Neighborhood Empowerment Advocate said the Congress of Neighborhoods is on Saturday, September 24, 2022 via Zoom and registration opens August 27 2022. Los Angeles County Supervisor District 3 LAUSD District 3, Blake Clayton, West Valley/Mt. Communities Field Deputy & Caseworker, said the County has monkeypox information available at phlacounty.gov/monkeypox. Covid numbers are steadily increasing. <u>22-0061</u> - Proposed draft letter regarding the draft land use designation, for Community Plan for Canoga Park-Winnetka-Woodland Hills-West Hills:

Dan Brin moved to strike the paragraph:

We view this failure in the context of a long history of snubs to our community's identity and integrity. For example, we have witnessed the spectacle of another Neighborhood Council granting "approval" of the LAFD helicopter facility in the Nature Preserve without even informing the department that the project was in West Hills. As a result, the residents of the affected area, all of them West Hills residents, were denied representation in a decision that directly concerned them.

Steve Randall said a Specific Plan covers the area and takes precedence over the Community Plan. Anthony Scearce said his request to have this item postponed was ignored. He also said the City Planning website explicitly says Community Plan boundaries do not correspond to Neighborhood Council boundaries, and he has a petition opposing the proposed change signed by ninety local residents. Bryan Newman said he would like to see the boundaries stay as they are. Joanne Yvanek-Garb said she has attended ten to twenty meetings on this since the subject came up three or four years ago. Myrl Schreibman said there is too much bickering over land neither Neighborhood Council has any control over. Reeyan Raynes said zoning codes ultimately determine use and a boundary change will not make much difference. Goat Puppet suggested delaying for further study.

Anthony Scearce moved to postpone a vote on this item to September. Bryan Newman seconded. Steve Randall said West Hills is split and should not be. Anthony Scearce said the petition asks to remove only a small portion of northwest West Hills, and not everything above Roscoe, from City Planning's proposal.

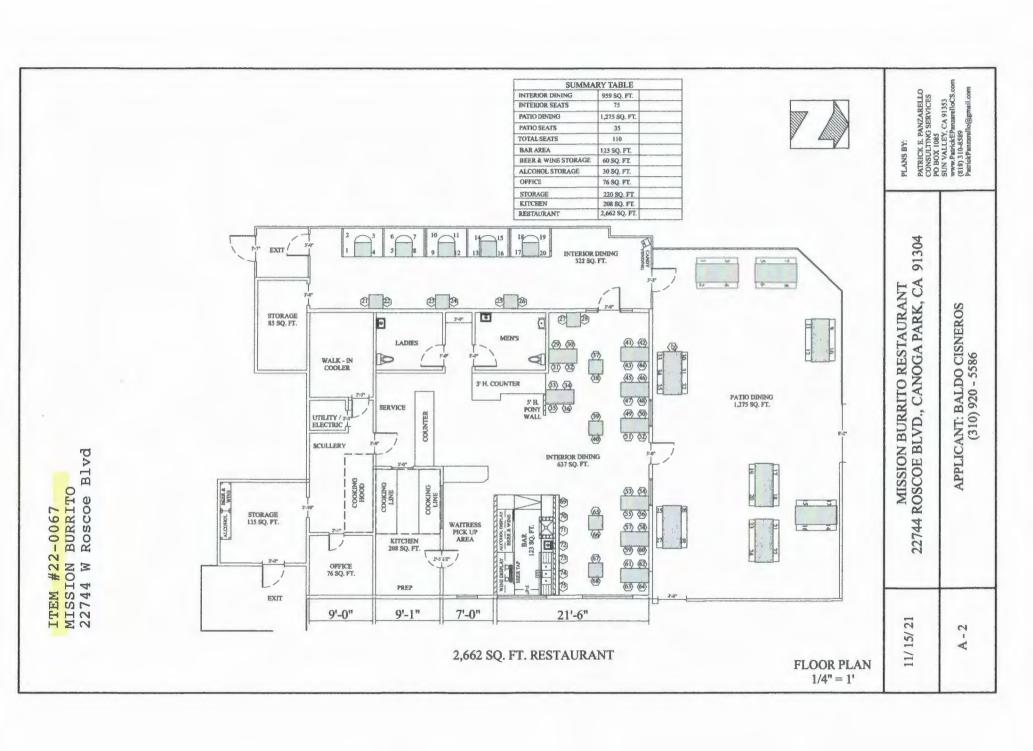

# **RULES, ELECTIONS & INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS**

# RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state or federal governmental body or agency must have first been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council with the concurrence of the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, under existing California state law, the *Alcoholic Beverage Control Act (1935)*, the sale of alcohol is prohibited between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. and is regulated by the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control; and

WHEREAS, currently pending before the State legislature is SB 930 (Wiener), which aims to expand nightlife by authorizing, the selling/purchasing of alcoholic beverages at on-sale licensed premises (restaurants, bars, taverns, and nightclubs) between the hours of 2 a.m. and 4 a.m., through a pilot program in select cities — Cathedral City, Coachella, Fresno, Oakland, Palm Springs, and West Hollywood, and the City and County of San Francisco; and

WHEREAS, since the early 2000s, there have been numerous attempts to extend the time period for alcohol sales past 2:00 a.m. for on-sale establishments (restaurant, bars, taverns, nightclubs), and each bill has either failed in a policy committee or by Governor veto. The most recent attempt was SB 58 (Wiener) in 2019; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that alcohol abuse costs Californians \$35 billion with over 11,000 deaths annually, most of the costs resulting from losses in workplace productivity (72% of the total cost), health care expenses for treating problems caused by excessive drinking (11% of total), law enforcement and other criminal justice expenses (10%), and losses from motor vehicle crashes related to alcohol use (5%); and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Community Preventive Services Task Force found that every two-hour increase in last-call times results in greater vehicle crash injuries and emergency room admissions; and

WHEREAS, extending the cutoff time for alcohol sales to 4 a.m. poses serious public safety concerns and could lead to an increase incidence of drunk driving and potentially to increased alcohol related fatalities and injuries; and

WHEREAS, there is no such thing as local control in alcohol policy, inasmuch as the harm from one city's decision to change last-call times splashes over to every abutting local jurisdiction, and will have regional consequences by forcing neighboring cities or counties to absorb increased public safety costs related to drunk driving control, response, assistance to break up fights, domestic violence service calls, and traffic collisions; and

WHEREAS, many California residents living near bars, taverns, nightclubs, and restaurants already suffer from high levels of noise and traffic disturbance, and extending the cutoff time for alcohol sales to 4 a.m. would only exacerbate these nuisance disturbances;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that upon the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2021-2022 State Legislative Program OPPOSITION to SB 930 (Wiener), which would allow select cities in California to issue permits extending the cutoff time for alcohol sales to 4 a.m., which could lead to an increased incidence of drunk driving, and exacerbate the noise and traffic disturbance suffered by residents living in abutting cities, and near restaurants, bars, taverns, and night clubs; and force neighboring cities and/or county to absorb increased public safety

enforcement costs.

### ABSTRACT - SB918

Existing law prohibits a person from carrying a concealed firearm or carrying a loaded firearm in public. Existing law authorizes a licensing authority, as specified, if good cause exists for the issuance, and subject to certain other criteria including, among other things, the applicant is of good moral character and has completed a specified course of training, to issue a license to carry a concealed handgun or to carry a loaded and exposed handgun, as specified. Under existing law, the required course of training for an applicant is no more than 16 hours and covers firearm safety and laws regarding the permissible use of a firearm.

This bill would require the licensing authority to issue or renew a license if the applicant is a qualified person for the license and the applicant is at least 21 years of age. The bill would remove the good character and good cause requirements from the issuance criteria. Under the bill, the applicant would not be a qualified person if they, among other things, are reasonably likely to be a danger to self, others, or the community at large, as specified. This bill would add the requirement that the applicant be the recorded owner, with the Department of Justice, of the pistol, revolver, or other firearm capable of being concealed upon the person. This bill would change the training requirement to be no less than 16 hours in length and would add additional subjects to the course including, among other things, the safe storage and legal transportation of firearms. The bill would require an issuing authority, prior to that issuance, renewal, or amendment to a license, if it has direct access to the designated department system to determine if the applicant is the recorded owner of the pistol, revolver, or other firearm. The bill would require an issuing authority without access to that system to confirm the ownership with the sheriff of the county in which the agency is located. By requiring local agencies to issue licenses for concealed firearms, this bill would create a state-mandated local program. The bill would require a licensing authority to provide the applicant notice if a new license or license renewal is denied or revoked. If an application is denied or a license is revoked, the bill would permit the applicant to request a hearing to challenge the license denial or revocation. If a new license or license renewal is denied or revoked, the bill would authorize the applicant to seek a writ of mandate from a superior court within 30 days of receipt of notice of denial or revocation, and require the licensing authority to inform the applicant of the ability to seek a writ of mandate. By imposing new duties on local licensing authorities, this bill would create a state-mandated local program.

Existing law requires an agency issuing a license described above to set forth specified information on the license, including, among other things, the licensee's name, occupation, and reason for desiring a license to carry the weapon.

This bill would revise that information to include, among other things, the licensee's driver's license or identification number, fingerprints, and information relating to the date of expiration of the license, and would remove the requirement that the license detail the reason for desiring a license to carry the weapon.

Existing law requires an applicant for a license described above to provide fingerprints, as specified. Existing law exempts an applicant from this requirement if they have previously applied to the same licensing authority and the applicant's fingerprints have previously been forwarded to the department, as specified, and instead requires that authority to note data that would provide positive identification in the files of the department, on the copy of any subsequent license submitted to the department.

This bill would require the department to notify the licensing authority if the department is unable to ascertain, among other things, the final disposition of an arrest or criminal charge under state or federal law that would prohibit the person from possessing, receiving, owning, or purchasing a firearm. The bill would require the licensing authority to instead collect the applicant's fingerprint that would provide that positive identification in the files of the department, as specified. This bill would prohibit a license from being issued or renewed unless the department reports to a licensing authority that the applicant is eligible to possess, receive, own, or purchase a firearm.

Existing law requires a licensing authority to charge an additional fee in an amount equal to reasonable processing costs for a new license. Existing law also prohibits a licensing authority from imposing, among other things, a requirement or condition that an applicant pay additional funds or obtain liability insurance.

This bill would authorize a licensing authority to charge the additional processing cost fee for a license renewal and would permit the licensing authority to collect the first 50% of the fee upon filing of the application. The bill also removes the prohibition on licensing authority requirements for additional fees or liability insurance.

Existing law requires that licenses and applications for licenses be uniform throughout the state, and to be submitted upon forms prescribed by the Attorney General. When revising the standard application form for licenses, existing law requires the Attorney General to convene a committee to review and revise the existing application form. Existing law requires the Attorney General to develop a uniform license that may be used as indicia of proof of licensure throughout the state. Existing law also requires the committee to convene to review and revise the design standard for a uniform license.

This bill would authorize the Attorney General to revise the standard form for licenses and the design standard if the committees do not revise the form or issue a design standard by October 31, 2022.

Under existing law, it is a crime to bring a firearm into a state or local building or any residence of the Governor, any other constitutional officer, or Member of the Legislature. Existing law exempts a licensee from that prohibition if, among other things, the licensee has a valid license to carry the firearm.

This bill would remove those exemptions, except as specified. The bill would also prohibit a licensee from carrying a firearm to specified locations, including, among other places, a building designated for a court proceeding and a place of worship, as defined,

with specific exceptions. By expanding the scope of an existing crime, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

Existing law prohibits a person from knowingly possessing a firearm in a sterile area of an airport, passenger vessel terminal, or public transit facility, as defined.

This bill would additionally prohibit a person from knowingly possessing a firearm in any building, real property, or parking area under the control of an airport or passenger vessel terminal, as specified. By expanding the scope of an existing crime, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

Existing law, the Gun-Free School Zone Act of 1995, makes it a crime to possess a firearm in a place that the person knows, or reasonably should know, is a school zone. Existing law defines a school zone as an area in, or on the grounds of, a public or private school providing instruction in kindergarten or grades 1 to 12, inclusive, or within a distance of 1,000 feet from the grounds of the public or private school. Existing law provides exceptions to that crime, including if a person with a valid concealed carry license who is carrying the firearm described in the license in an area that is not in, or on the grounds of, a public or private school and when a firearm is an unloaded pistol, revolver, or other firearm capable of being concealed on the person and is in a locked container or within the locked trunk of a motor vehicle.

This bill would revise the exception for a person who has a valid concealed carry license to permit them to carry a specified firearm in an area that is not within any building, real property, or parking area under the control of a public or private school, as specified.

Existing law requires a licensing authority to revoke a license to carry a firearm if the licensing authority is notified by the department or the licensing authority determines that a licensee is prohibited from possessing, receiving, owning, or purchasing a firearm under state or federal law.

This bill would also require a licensing authority to revoke a license if, among other things, a licensee has provided inaccurate or incomplete information on their application for a new license or license renewal.

Existing law authorizes a licensing authority to impose reasonable restrictions on the time, place, manner, and circumstances when a licensee may carry a firearm capable of being concealed.

While carrying a firearm, this bill would prohibit a licensee from, among other things, consuming an alcoholic beverage or controlled substance and falsely represent that the licensee is a peace officer.

The bill would authorize the department to adopt emergency regulations to implement the concealed firearm licensing system, as specified.

This bill would make conforming changes.

The bill would additionally make various findings and declarations of the Legislature.

The bill would state that its provisions are severable.

This bill would incorporate additional changes to Section 29805 of the Penal Code proposed by AB 2239 to be operative only if this bill and AB 2239 are enacted and this bill is enacted last.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that with regard to certain mandates no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

With regard to any other mandates, this bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs so mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to the statutory provisions noted above.

This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as an urgency statute.

### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state, or federal government body or agency must have first been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council with the concurrence of the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, for many decades the United States Supreme Court has stated consistently and unequivocally that nothing in the United States Constitution prohibits states and local governments from imposing reasonable regulations on firearms, including prohibitions on possession by certain individuals and on carrying firearms in sensitive places; and

WHEREAS, recent rulings by the Court have abandoned well-established understanding of the Second Amendment and will now force local jurisdictions, including Los Angeles, to issue permits to carry concealed weapons (CCWs) much more broadly than has ever previously been the case; and

WHEREAS, these recent rulings gravely endanger the public's safety in Los Angeles and other cities by compelling the issuance of CCWs to potentially thousands of applicants who previously would have been denied the ability to carry concealed weapons in public; and

WHEREAS, legislation currently pending in the California State Legislature, SB 918 (Portantino) seeks to comport California law with the recent Supreme Court rulings while still preserving reasonable public safety protections; and

WHEREAS, among other things, SB 918 would specify certain sensitive locations where firearms cannot be carried, notwithstanding the issuance of a CCW permit; and

WHEREAS, Los Angeles and other local jurisdictions may have particular needs to restrict CCW permit holders from carrying firearms in sensitive locations or engaging in other dangerous activities relevant to that locality that are not currently specified in the statewide prohibitions of SB 918; and

WHEREAS, SB 918 would also permit local governments to require psychological testing of an applicant as a condition for issuance of a CCW permit, and such psychological testing is a vitally important tool to determine whether an individual is a danger to themselves or others before a CCW permit is issued; and

WHEREAS, SB 918 prohibits the licensing authority from charging an applicant more than two hundred dollars (\$200) for psychological testing, but in Los Angeles such testing would cost the Los Angeles Police Department far more than that, thus creating an unfunded state mandate and putting the taxpayers of Los Angeles in the position of subsidizing the issuance of CCW permits; and

WHEREAS, under current law, Section 26205 of the California Penal Code requires a licensing authority to give written notice indicating whether an application is approved or denied within 90 days of the initial application for a new license or a license renewal, and a period of 90 days will be wholly inadequate to meet the anticipated demand for new licenses while also ensuring public safety;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2022-2022 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for SB 918 (Portantino) IF AMENDED (i) to permit full cost recovery for processing of license



applications and psychological testing, (ii) to state explicitly that local governments may adopt additional restrictions on the allowable activities of a CCW permit holder beyond those specified in the bill, and (iii) to amend Section 26205 of the Penal Code to require a local licensing authority to give written notice indicating whether an application is approved or denied within "a reasonable amount of time" rather than setting an arbitrary time limit.
